Spirit Lake women prepare television programs

A new school district sponsored project has four Spirit Lake women lugging cameras, editing video tape and arranging interviews.

The women, Julie McWilliams, Joan McCulloch, Ruth Nolting and Roslyn Greenlee are the production, directing and technical crew of WHATS (What's Happening At The Schools.) Their first

program, covering the current construction at the high school, followed by a discussion of the new elementary building, will be telecast Thursday at 6:30 p.m. over channel 2 on cable TV.

Better communication between the school and the community is the purpose of WHATS.

Wanda Skogerboe through the Voluntary Action Center originally contacted the all-volunteer crew. All four women have had broadcasting audio visual experience.

PROGRAMS PLANNED

The half hour programs will be telecast every other Thursday in the 6:30 time slot. Each program will focus on an activity or project at the school, including community education projects. The women have already planned to film a segment about the band, a program covering the activities of this weekend's Pan Am festival, a program introducing Area Education Agency personel and segments dealing with classroom situations and projects. The women welcome community input for further program ideas.

Specific jobs within the production crew have not yet been assigned. So far, each woman has been helping with every phase of production. Training on the equipment has been provided by the camera salesman, Lorie Larsen, and by Ken Kannenberg.

The project has had a few problems, now all solved. The women had to wait

three months for the delivery of their camera and there was an initial technical problem, in broadcasting over the cable system.

INVOLVEMENT

The crew members (Roslyn Greenlee was unavailable for this interview) all have different reasons for working on the project, but they share a common sentiment - they've all truly enjoyed their work on the programs.



The public is invited to the meeting and refreshments will be served.

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


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
