Harold Halsey Howe, the son of Charles and Emma Anderson Howe, was born Sept. 19, 1909, in Spencer. His childhood years were spent in the Spencer community, where he received his early schooling. He continued his education at Grinnell College, graduating in 1931.

Harold married Maxine Thomas on April 8, 1937, in Spencer. With the exception of the two years that Harold served in the Navy during WWII, Harold and Maxine have made their home in Spencer. Harold worked a short time for Spencer Dry Cleaners, before beginning his career with Northwest Federal Savings and Loan, which encompassed serving on the Board of Directors, the Presidency and as Director Emeritus. He retired as President of Northwest Federal in 1977, having been with them for 30 years.

Harold was a member of the First Congregational Church, having the distinction of being the oldest and longest active member of 72 years, being confirmed in 1925. In addition, he was an active member of the community, being selected as the first Spencer Man of the Year. Harold had served as either President or Chairman of the Boards of the YMCA, Spencer Country Club, Spencer Airport Advisory Board, Spencer Airport Board, Spencer Industries Foundation and the Spencer Municipal Utilities. His activities at the airport earned him the honor of having the terminal named the 'Harold Howe Terminal' in 1991. He was also co-founder and past president of the Sunset Retirement Home, past Exalted Ruler of the Elks Club, organizer and first president of SCORE and had served on the APPA Legislative Committee in Washington, DC. He had also earned and maintained a commercial pilot's license.

He was preceded in death by his parents; one daughter, Sharon Hitchcock; one granddaughter, Kristin Howe; one sister, Dorothy Good and one brother, John Howe.

Harold is survived by his wife, Maxine; three daughters and their husbands: July and Earl Check of Madrid, Linda and Gary Swain of Littleton, Colo., Marcia and Nick Arnold of Valparaiso, Ind., one son and his wife Thomas C. and Susan Howe of Spencer; 12 grandchildren, 12 great grandchildren; one sister, Helen Nielsen of Wahpeton, and other relatives and friends.

Carroll A. Lane

Funeral services for former West Okoboji resident Carroll Lane were on Oct. 9, 1997, at the United Methodist Church in Carroll. Mr. Lane, 93, died Oct. 5, 1997, at Yankton, S.D., home of his son, Jon. The Reverend David Clark officiated the service. Casket bearers were Mr. Lane's grandchildren and their spouses. Burial was in the Carroll Cemetery, with Dahn and Woodhouse Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

Carroll Lane was born on May 9, 1905 in Eldora, the son of George and Lillian Lane. They lived in Jasper County during the early years, then moved to Carroll. He attended Iowa State College, where he participated in wrestling, graduating in 1926 with a degree in Agricultural Economics and Education. He was a lifelong member of Delta Sigma Phi Fraternity. He taught school in Gilman, Rolfe, and Early before teaching and coaching in Carroll, and became the principal of Carroll Schools. He was elected to the Board of Education and served as President.

In 1935 he married music teacher Mildred Johnston in Fairfield. Mr. Lane served Carroll County in the Iowa House of Representatives in 1943 and 1944, and was a delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1944. He was Secretary of the Iowa State Senate from 1951 to 1973 and wrote the Text for the History of the Iowa State Capital Building, published in the Iowa booklet 'Under the Golden Dome'.

In 1944 the Lanes purchased Crescent Beach Lodge of Lake Okoboji and operated it until the 1970s. During that time they added to the resort the new Dining and Convention rooms, Thunderbird Lodge accommodations, and the Island Playground, completing the Family summer resort. He as a member and officer of the Okoboji Protective Association which entertained All Iowa Days at Crescent Beach including the Governor, all State Officials, Legislators, Lobbyists and spouses for a weekend of summer activities.

Recent winters were spent in Fort Meyers Beach, Florida, along with friends from Okoboji.

Carroll Lane started the first Carroll County Cyclone Club, was an early Century Club Member and a Cardinal Club Member. He was chosen Cy's Favorite in 1979. He was a member of the Carroll Methodist Church, the Carroll Elk's Club, the Masons, and served as President of the Iowa Restaurant Association.

He is survived by his wife Mildred and son Jon of Yankton, a daughter Lynda Lane of Carroll, three grandchildren, and five great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his parents and one brother.
